Alice's memories as a proud veteran:

"I was working with the T. Eaton Company in Woodstock when I decided to join the Air Force. I was sent to MacDonald, Manitoba - 3B and G Gunnery School where for about a year we were trained as gunners for the aircraft. Then in a rush I found myself posted overseas in '43.

It was an exciting time, of course. We were sent on the Queen Elizabeth via Halifax and New York. We landed in Scotland - Firth of Clyde and ended up in London, with a brief stop in Bournemouth, to join the overseas base post office; all the mail going to Europe, or England, went through this post office.

Of course, there were "doodlebugs" (V1 rocket bomb) and black-outs which everybody experienced during that time.

We were right uptown in London during my first black out trying to find our way in the dark. I remember one time we were in a building with a glass roof and large windows in the front. One time we all had to get under the table, and the lights were swinging, but the doodlebug didn't come down on us.

There were good times and bad times. Of course, it was exciting, but we had to work hard. We were overwhelmed at Christmas, and had to work nights some times to get caught up with the mail.

There were about forty girls, and we were all sent over at the same time to do the post office work. We were together for about two years...over two years. We got to know everybody; they were a great bunch of girls."

Electricity Production Begins...



CEO Akos Hoffer and CFO Ross Ouane celebrate the official start of Perlev Rideau's electricity generation. Solar panels on three Perlev Rideau rooftops are

now connected to the hydro grid and have begun producing electricity. The 1,235 solar panels have the capacity to generate approximately 250 MWh of electricity per year resulting in estimated receipts of \$239,000 annually for the next 20 years from Ontario Power Authority's Feed in Tariff program.

This was the final step of the Energy and Facility Renewal Program with Honeywell. For the combined project, we invested \$6,402,000 million and expect to save approximately \$600,000 in utility and operating costs annually. The program will also lower our carbon dioxide emission by 320 metric tonnes annually – equivalent to removing 53 medium size cars from the road each year.

In addition to the solar array, a wide range of energy and infrastructure upgrades were implemented aimed to reduce operating costs and enhance the indoor environment for our residents. The upgrades included: High-efficiency Central Heating and Cooling Plant – The new plant improves heating and cooling reliability while reducing operating costs. The new plant can be seen in operation through the windows in the Perley Rideau Centre – Gatineau corridor.

Building Envelope – All exterior doors have been weather-sealed to help reduce drafts and improve comfort.

Water Conservation – Over 550 toilets and washroom fixtures have been replaced with low flow type models. These upgrades will reduce our water costs by 1/3, saving over \$57,000 per year and lower water usage will drop by close to 21 000m³, enough water to fill approximately 8.3 Olympic size pools.


Lighting System – Over 5,500 lighting fixtures have been replaced throughout the facilities. Lamps and ballasts (electronic device) were replaced with new generation high efficiency models. The new lighting systems and controls will reduce the amount of electricity required to operate the lighting fixtures saving close to \$42,000 per year.

Building Automation – Upgrades to the building automation system were completed providing more efficient control of heating, cooling and ventilation systems.

Air flow – Air circulation system has been optimized so that the air flow closely matches the building occupancy needs.

"This is great news for Perley Rideau as we strive to become ever more sustainable," says Akos Hoffer. "Not only have we improved comfort for our residents, but we have also optimized energy management while upgrading our facility infrastructure."

Results of 2013 Volunteer Survey



The Perley Rideau volunteers participated in a province-wide Volunteer Opinion Survey in November/December of 2013. Over 8,000 volunteers from 32 hospitals/health centres completed the survey, identifying areas of strength and opportunities for growth. Forty-six questions were asked in the following dimensions: Volunteer Experience and Impact, Orientation, Recognition, Teamwork, Patient Safety and General Safety. As shown in the chart above, Perley Rideau survey results scored above average in five of the six categories.

The first dimension, "Volunteer Experience and Impact", included questions on how the Health Centre makes volunteers feel welcome, the availability and degree of support from staff, availability of information to support the volunteer's role, perception of volunteers on their contribution to improve resident care and to provide support to staff and the overall impression of their impact on making the Health Centre a better place. The average satisfaction rating in this area was 93.8% and the Perley Rideau's score was 96.4%, placing us fifth amongst participating institutions.

Perley Rideau received the **highest score** of all participants in the area of "**Orientation**". Factors measured in this category included the volunteers' awareness of their Health Centre's procedures; occasional feedback to the volunteers on how they are doing; more educational opportunities on various topics; and of volunteers in the different programs. Regular feedback meetings with groups mission, introduction to the Centre and the

volunteer's role, and how the information the volunteer received prepared them to interact with residents. **The average score was 94.9% and our score was 98.1%.**

"Recognition" included questions on respect and thanks received from staff and volunteer resources, the importance of formal volunteer recognition and the extent to which volunteer time is put to good use. The average score was 92.2% and our score was 96.5%, representing the second highest rating. Seventy-one percent of our volunteers noted that a formal volunteer recognition event is important to them.

"Teamwork" focused on the experience volunteers have as a team member in their placement area. Factors included introduction and information for specific activities, approachability of staff, support and direction, staff feedback and openness for receiving suggestions from volunteers. The average score was 88.7% and Perley Rideau's score was 93.3%, putting us in second place.

The fifth dimension concentrated on "Patient Safety", or the knowledge the volunteers have to protect themselves and others from infections, their comfort level in informing staff of concerns related to patient safety, means to report patient safety issues and confidence that issues will be addressed. The average score was 95.4% and our score was 95.6%

Finally, questions around "General Safety" were concerned with the understanding of policies and guidelines by the volunteers and if the volunteers where asked to do unsafe things. Our score was 93.5% which put us just below the average of 94.5 %.

The survey turned out to be an important tool for the Volunteer Office staff to look at some areas that need attention. Some ideas include: a refresher on updated policies and emergency and safety procedures; occasional feedback to the volunteers on how they are doing; more educational opportunities on various topics; and regular feedback meetings with groups of volunteers in the different programs.

Employee and Volunteer Open Forum

The second of this year's planned open forums was held with 162 staff and volunteers attending seven sessions on May 20 and 21. Presentations were made by Akos Hoffer and Mary Boutette.

Topics covered were:

- Accreditation Canada survey results
- Inspection Results

Congratulations were expressed for the very good results.

The second half of the session was dedicated to your comments, concerns and feedback. Many of the questions and comments related to the reorganization in the LTC to take effect June 1, 2014. Carolyn Andrews indicated that a follow-up meeting would be held soon to discuss and clarify roles and responsibilities with all those affected by the change.

We received 76 feedback forms from you at the end of the session. Again, with a few exceptions, you thought that the session content and format were good. Based on your input, we need to make further improvements in giving feedback and following up on actions.



Now that we have had about six months of actual experience and having received input from employees, visitors, tenants, and others affected, we are making the following modifications to the parking arrangements, which only apply to the day shift, when parking spaces are at a premium. Parking will be monitored for adherence between 7am and 3pm Monday to Friday.

Relocate parking for tenants and visitors nearer to access doors.

The parking area running alongside 1720 is designated solely for visitors of long-term care residents or tenants in the apartments, and, for tenants themselves as part of their leasing arrangements. To assist those visitors, who are mostly seniors, in caring for their loved ones they are being provided with the parking closest to the Main Entrance. Even once they are inside they still have a long walk.

Increase parking for staff and volunteers.

The lot across from the Guest House is designated solely for staff parking. To facilitate the use of this lot, we have identified a new staff entrance (S) shown on the attached schematic.

Designate parking areas for one specific purpose.

Note that at each of the Rideau and Gatineau entrances, the visitor and the staff parking areas are being separated. Also note that students who are doing placement are not visitors, should park in the staff areas only.

Effective date for changes

New signage for these parking areas has been ordered. When ready, we will alert you of the effective date. This is expected to be in a few weeks.

The Arctic Star Medal

The Arctic Star, a military honour unveiled by the United Kingdom, is now a recognized military honour in Canada. Eligible Canadian Veterans can wear the medal with other Second World War honours. Canadian Second World War Veterans who



served north of the Arctic Circle (North of Iceland, east of Greenland to Russia – Greenland Sea, Norwegian Sea and Barents Sea) from September 3, 1939 to May 8, 1945, are eligible for the Arctic Star. Eligible Veterans and next-of-kin can now apply for the

British Arctic Star.

For your application, you will need to provide your service number, branch and theatre of service, date of birth, current name and address.


