20th Anniversary Celebration a Community Affair at Perley Rideau

Those attending the 20th anniversary at the Perley Rideau were treated not only to the celebratory cake in Lupton Hall after the formal ceremony, but to a variety of speeches and stories that shared a common theme: Community. Perhaps family member Sandra Seymor summed it up best when she looked out at the crowd and said, "What does the Perley Rideau mean to me? It means Welcome! It means that even if I am not able to be here to see my mother, I know she is well looked after." Who could ask for more?

Over 100 years ago the heirs of the Perley family used their property on Wellington Street to plant the seeds and establish the roots for what is now The Perley and Rideau Veterans' Health Centre (Perley Rideau). The roots were grounded in the spirit of creating a community for those in long term care, and in the greater community of the City of Ottawa. At the 20th anniversary of the new facility, CEO Akos Hoffer emphasized that the Perley Rideau continues to "expand as a centre of excellence" adding "I know we have tested your limits for change, but we are better for it." In the speeches and stories that followed, everyone spoke of the Perley Rideau as a place where caring, connections and collaboration are the cornerstone for a true community.

Ottawa Mayor Jim Watson shared his memory of John Lupton who fought hard to ensure that Veterans would

have a long-term home – a facility that started small and has become a federal model that accommodates a large range of programs and services for seniors in the community. As a tribute to long-term caregivers, Mayor Watson spoke described them as the "angels of today", especially poignant following the recent passing of his father, a Second World War Veteran. John Fraser, MPP for Ottawa South, spoke about his personal connections to Perley Rideau that included his mother's work as a registered nurse at the Perley Hospital and his sister, Missy, who currently works in the Recreation and Creative Arts Program. Fraser thanked Perley Rideau staff for 20 years of "caring and making a difference in the lives of the residents but also in the lives of the families of the residents". David McGuinty, MP Ottawa South, abandoned his prepared speech to recall his own connections to Perley Rideau beginning with his mother who was a nurse at the Perley Rideau for many years. He also spoke about his brother, Dalton, and the profound impact that volunteering had on his vision of community once he became Ontario's Premier.

The Honourable Kent Hehr, Minister of Veterans Affairs Canada and the Associate Minister of Defence for the Government of Canada, stated, "Every day I have lived in peace and security thanks in large to the men and women who live here". He added that Perley Rideau is a place

where caring, sharing and building lives occurs on a daily basis. "We know you have not only served our nation in the past you continue to build community". Charles Lemieux, Chairman of the Perley and Rideau Veterans' Health Centre Foundation, said that "behind every donation, is a story". And it is the stories of the people who live and work at the Perley Rideau that best show what it means to be a part of this evolving community.

George Couillard spoke on behalf of Perley Rideau's residents. He recalled the early days when he and wife Dora were two of the early tenants in the apartments. He spoke about the importance of couples being able to stay together as they grow older and that he values Perley Rideau's scope of services as he has moved into long-term care. Joan Olinik, a family member, volunteer and donor, revealed that has already has name on the apartment waiting list, an endorsement for Perley Rideau's exemplary care and the supports available for the region's seniors. In

her address, Joan recognized the barber, to the cleaning staff, recreation staff, gift-shop, pub, pharmacy, and staff, illustrating the variety of roles performed for this community. Alison Wheeler, a RPN, was chosen to speak on behalf of the staff, revealed that she was who was following in her grandmother's footsteps as a nurse and staff member at Perley Rideau. Alison expressed her excitement to be part of the Perley Rideau's evolution. The final words went to former Canadian ambassador Ted Lee, who, along with his wife, live in the Perley Rideau aprtments. Ted focussed on the diversity of residents and staff at the Perley to reflect what we know is truly Canadian.

The variety of speakers and perspectives reflect the ongoing commitment of the Perley Rideau community to ensure that the seeds planted over 100 years ago continue to grow.





Our programs are forward looking; we support new experiences and self-discovery for our seniors and provide opportunities for ongoing learning and experimentation.

The Perley-Rideau Village "Wall of Creativity" will be located along the curved wall in the main entrance hallway and art installation will begin immediately and continue throughout the year. We hope that our community will contribute toward this art installation and visit it often as it expands and immortalizes Perley Rideau's roots and more than two decades at the Russell Road location.

It is our intention that this Wall of Creativity will become a popular spot to snap selfies and photos that can be shared through social media while upholding our commitment to protect the dignity and privacy of Perley Rideau's residents and community.

"Wave Upon Wave, A Sea of Creativity"

Unique personal canvases, panels and tiles will soon adorn a wall in the Atrium of Perley Rideau Centre. These original creations will draw from the various media taught at Perley Rideau: Wood, Painting, Mosaic, Clay, Textiles.

The Perley Rideau Community may also choose to include words, text memories and photos in a collage format. The works would be displayed gallery style with an estimated first run of 80 - 100 small works (individual size approximately 14 x 9 in., 12 x 8 in. each) and continue to grow from there.

These individual creations will be dated, titled and include the artist's name if the artist or family members so choose. The 'Sea of Creativity' will continue for years to come as new waves are created and the Perley Rideau community continues to change and grow.

- Thanks to all the more than 60 staff members who attended the June 14th and 15th engagement sessions to learn more about the Sub-Acute Unit for the Frail Elderly (SAFE Unit)
- · Sessions took place on day, evening and night shifts to accommodate all interested staff.
- The topics covered included:
 - o Overview and rationale



Antimicrobial Stewardship Update

Since their discovery, antibiotics, also known as antimicrobials, have been deemed one of the most important discoveries in the history of modern medicine. When used properly for bacterial infections, antimicrobials are a powerful tool for curing or obliterating the resulting disease. However, also since their discovery, resistance to antimicrobials has become a growing concern. Resistance means that the bug has "learned" how to survive despite the antimicrobial, forcing us to select another antimicrobial, which then leads to more potential resistance to the next antimicrobial and so on and so forth. In the past decade, resistance to antimicrobials has been on the rise while new antimicrobial development has been on the decline, which means that these powerful drugs are now a scarce resource.

Antimicrobial resistant bugs have been dubbed by the media as "superbugs". We often hear stories about these bugs spreading in hospitals and other health care settings, sometimes causing "incurable" infections.

Fortunately for us, Infection Prevention and Control Practices helps us limit the transmission of these [and other] bugs in our setting. We implement additional precautions and processes when we identify these bugs, and of course we do meticulous hand hygiene. However, these measures do not prevent the emergence of antibiotic resistance through another mean known as selective pressure. Simply put, resistance through selective pressure happens when certain antimicrobials are used frequently and thus resistance to them emerges.

Antimicrobial stewardship is the key to solving this amongst other problems related to antibiotic resistance. Antimicrobial stewardship is defined as a "collection of interventions geared toward optimizing the prescribing of antimicrobials, and includes the appropriate selection, dosing, route and duration of antimicrobial therapy with the goal of optimizing patient outcomes and decreasing adverse events related to antimicrobial therapy." Simply put, once an indication is identified for an antimicrobial, antimicrobial stewardship is the:

- Right drug, at the
- Right time, using the
- Right dose, and for the
- Right duration

Here at Perley Rideau, our organization is in the development phase of an Antimicrobial Stewardship Program co-led by Dan Dalton, Clinical Pharmacist and Caroline Meguerditchian, Infection Control Coordinator. Since September of 2015, a strategic team has been working on the building blocks of such a program. As of January, a multidisciplinary team has been recruited with executive support from Linda Hunter, Chief Nursing Officer, Infectious Disease expertise from Dr. Gary Victor, Internist, and ad hoc support from the microbiology lab. Our frontline staff has been engaged in this process as well. We are also fortunate to have a medical resident, Dr. Samuel Blanchette-Bourrassa, working with the team on a research project related to prescribing habits in select clinical situations.

The program aims to:

Optimize resident safety.

- Achieve best clinical outcomes related to antimicrobial use.
- Minimize toxicity and other adverse events related to antimicrobial use such as *clostridium difficile* infections.
- Reduce resistance.

Our focus for 2016 is urinary tract infections. Analysis of antimicrobial use has shown that the majority of the antibiotics are used for presumed urinary tract infections. The team is exploring this further to identify opportunities for minimizing unnecessary use of antibiotics and optimizing their use when indicated.

Work in this area continues and we are very excited at what lays ahead. This program is unique to our home, and we look forward to sharing the lessons learned and improvements made for the safety and well-being of the people we serve.



Hand Hygiene: Clean Care is Safer Care!

Hand Hygiene is the cornerstone of all Infection Prevention and Control Activities. Here at Perley Rideau we have an intent focus on improving hand hygiene practices amongst all of our staff, family, visitors and residents.

How do we do this?

We talk about Hand Hygiene at every opportunity we have. It is an engrained practice in our care activities, in our programming activities and literally anything else that we do around our home. We do formal annual education and we do extensive in the moment teaching and role modelling. In addition to this we monitor our performance through direct observations. Direct observations are "audits" done by our hand hygiene champions at the bedside while staff is carrying out care activities with our residents. Keeping our residents safe is of the utmost importance for us, and hand hygiene plays the most important role in minimizing the spread of bugs from person to person.

In a health care setting, we talk about the 4 Moments of Hand Hygiene:

The 4 moments are key indications for the crucial times we as healthcare providers absolutely must clean our hands. These indications are outlined in the image below.

We are focused on increasing compliance with Hand Hygiene at Moment 1: before contact with the resident. Over the past month our staff accomplished 74% compliance with Hand Hygiene Moment 1. We hope to achieve greater than 90% compliance.

What are we currently doing?

We have a small but mighty hand hygiene quality improvement team that is relentlessly working on capturing our performance as it relates to hand hygiene compliance and to continue to enlist hand hygiene champions and incorporate hand hygiene into all of our processes. We are working on ways to share performance with frontline staff through posters and data in order to empower the frontline staff with understanding of performance and seek their input in where we can improve.

One thing we have learned is that some staff feel they are allergic to the alcohol-based hand rub. Alcohol-based hand rub is the most effective way to clean your hands, if you are worried about an allergy please discus with the Employee Health Coordinator so we can work with you to meet your needs.

Your 4 Moments for Hand Hygiene



The team will be looking at initiatives to engage our families and residents in hand hygiene because infection prevention and control involves everyone! Stay tuned for more on this.

May 5th was World Hand Hygiene Day and Perley Rideau celebrated the day by looking at hands under a black light, distributing hand hygiene postcards and goodies, talking about hand hygiene, and doing compliance observations. Bill and Tanya, two of our hand hygiene champions were the faces of the day. In addition to this, Bill went around the units with some tools to see what lurks in the dark. Staff from different departments were able to collect specimens from some common items to see how clean hands are keeping frequently touched equipment and surfaces clean and safe. The toilets were loaded with bugs but the drills used in the shop were kept shockingly clean. Our staff is doing a good job keeping computers and phones clean even a shoe lace was squeaky clean. Enjoy!



THE DOORS

Let me start by saying that this is a serious article. I know my last one was funny and quite popular. I promise the next TWO will be funny.

Now, when I say "The Doors", I'm not talking about the 60's rock band, I'm talking about "The Doors" at Perley Rideau. Although an article about "The Doors" would be awesome -- this

isn't the venue for that sort of thing. Also, this article on "The Doors" won't require a mind-altering substance for you to fully appreciate it.

Door security is EVERYONE'S concern and responsibility. This isn't an issue just for Commissionaires. We must always keep in mind that the Perley Rideau is someone's home and door security protects our residents.

OUTER DOORS

These are the doors which provide primary access to the facility. There is one for each Residence, one Staff Entrance and the Main Door (at Reception). There are also primary access points in the Gatineau link (to the mini-putt), as well as access to and from the Cafeteria and the Pub. With the exception of the Main Entrance, access through these doors requires an access card. Staff ID cards provide a double duty as building access cards, residents and non-staff have the plain white plastic access cards. If you do not have an access card, you are not supposed to gain access through doors that require access cards. All the doors of the Residences have large green and white signs (on both sides of the inner door) that clearly state that only cardholders are permitted through those doors. Also, all doors, except the Main Entrance are set so as to open only for Staff ID after 2300 daily.

The primary access doors to 1720 (Building A) and 1780 (Building B) operate like the doors in many other apartment buildings; the tenant grants access. The

Commissionaire is not permitted to allow anyone access to these buildings unless there is a prearranged procedure and they have received this procedure in writing from the managers of those buildings.

In a perfect world (and if I had my way) EACH and EVERY person passing through doors that required access cards would tap their cards for entry/exit. That means the one person taps and goes through the door and the next person waits until the door is closed to tap and pass through. To add to this, those without access cards would not be allowed admittance by those that do have access cards.

However, this is not a perfect world (and I seldom have my way – but that's a personal problem). Before you allow someone access to the facility, there are a couple of things you should think about. One, every time you allow someone you do not recognize through the doors you are increasing the risk of allowing someone into the facility that does not have authorized access. Two, the Perley Rideau has a "Watch List" of people who are no longer permitted on the property, let alone allowed access to the buildings. Can you immediately recall all the faces? If you can't, maybe you should think twice about allowing people into the facility that you do not recognize. Just saying.

INNER DOORS

Some inner doors can only be opened with a key, the rest have key code boxes installed. Ensure that doors which are supposed to be closed; remain closed. If you see an open door that is supposed to be closed, check to see if the area is occupied, if it is not then close the door. (Especially if you see doors open during evenings, nights and weekends.) If you're not sure if a door is supposed to be closed, ask the Commissionaire. In reference to doors with key code access, these key code boxes were installed so that staff can have immediate access to the areas behind these doors without the benefit (and the inconvenience) of a key. These serve the double duty of preventing Residents from gaining access to these areas. Due to the primary concern for resident safety, doors with key code boxes are to remain closed at all times. If you are occupying the room,

then the door can remain open. If the room is going to be unoccupied, even for a short time, please ensure the door is closed. If you see a key code door that is open and no one is in the room, do everyone a favour and please close it.

Doors which allow access to board rooms, meeting rooms, class rooms and other common areas which have expensive equipment in them (computers, projectors and whatnot) must be closed and locked when not occupied. This is not an option. You could be held financially liable if equipment goes missing.

FIRE EXITS

There are many, many fire exits (for obvious reasons). Some provide access between floors and some provide access to the outside and some provide both. What they all have in common is that they are not shortcuts. They are to be used for emergencies only. By the way; being late, being in a hurry, or just being plain lazy are not considered emergencies. There are fire stairs that are allowed to be used for day-to-day traffic. The use of these areas is according to prearranged and authorized procedures.

FIRE DOORS

There are two hallways that lead to Lupton Hall. Both of these hallways end in grey fire doors. These doors are to be closed at all times. They are never to be propped open for any reason at all. Door stops will be confiscated by Commissionaires.

In fact; no fire doors are to be propped open. The only fire doors that remain open are those with magnetic hold open devices. These can normally be found in hallways. When a fire alarm occurs these doors automatically close. These doors are not to be left open (by propping them with door stops, for instance) until the "Code Red – All Clear" notice has been given.

Fire doors not only help prevent the spread of fire, but they serve an equally important task of preventing smoke from spreading. Smoke can spread over an area more readily than fire can. Most fire related deaths are from smoke inhalation. This is really important to keep in mind as we have many, many residents with respiratory illnesses and they are more susceptible to the effects of smoke inhalation.

According to the Ontario Fire Code: "Every person who convenes any provision of the Fire Code and every Director

or Officer of a corporation who knowingly concurs in such contravention is guilty of an offence and is liable to a fine of not more than \$25,000 or imprisonment for a term of not more than one year or both." Now here's the Really Bad News: NO Director or Officer of the Perley Rideau knowingly concurs with ANY contravention of the Ontario Fire Code; so you'll be on your own as far as fines and jail time are concerned.

WHEELCHAIR ACCESS

If you are not using a wheelchair, scooter or walker, please do not use the auto open buttons for wheelchair access doors. This will help reduce the wear and tear on these complex and expensive mechanisms. I mean, how lazy do you have to be?

ROAM ALERT DOORS

Some doors are automatically locked when a person who is wearing a wander bracelet approaches them. When this happens an alarm sounds. The doors will not open, even with an access card, until the alarm is silenced. I have experienced many times when staff members have called me or BSO staff to silence the alarms. As a staff member it is your responsibility to know the codes and procedures to silence the roam alarms in your area. If you don't know, find out. Preferably BEFORE the alarm sounds.

In Conclusion: Access to the Perley Rideau is a privilege not a right. This privilege can be removed if a staff member is dismissed or if any person has been barred from the facility. If this privilege is removed there is something all should be aware of. In Ontario, a person can incur several penalties for trespassing. A sign does not have to be posted in order for a person to be considered in violation of the Trespass to Property Act. If a person does not have implied or explicit permission to be on any given premises (or that person has been barred from said premises), then they are in violation of this act and can be arrested by a police officer -- even without a warrant! (I bet you didn't know that.) If someone is found guilty, in a court of law, of violating Ontario's Trespass to Property Act; fines of up to \$2,000 can be assessed against the offender. As I said at the first of this article, door security is everyone's concern. Remember, the safety and security of our residents is one of our top priorities.

Ontario Volunteer Service Awards,


