## A Banner Year:

The Perley and Rideau Veterans' Health Centre Accepts the Best Practice Spotlight Organization (BPSO) Designation During Nursing Week 2019

On May 10, staff, residents and family members were joined by healthcare workers from across the region and VIPs to celebrate the Perley Rideau's achievement as a Best Practice Spotlight Organization (BSPO). Dr. Doris Grinspun, Chief Executive Officer of the Registered Nurses' Association of Ontario (RNAO), visited the Perley Rideau to celebrate Nursing Week 2019 and honour this rare achievement for a long-term care home.

The BPSO initiative involved a three-year commitment to implement internationally-recognized Best Practice Guidelines (BPGs) that provide current, comprehensive recommendations for resident care based on the latest research evidence.

During the journey to BPSO designation, the Perley Rideau implemented and sustained best practices related to four areas: pain management; falls prevention; skin and wound management; and caring for residents with delirium, dementia and/or depression. More than 70 members of the Perley Rideau's staff were formally trained as "Best Practice Champions" during three years. Five new Champions were recognized during the event including Amber Rinfret, RPN, the current the BPSO liaison leading champion engagement and BPSO sustainability programs.

Although the RNAO represents more than 40,000 nurses and the evidence is based in Nursing knowledge, the BPSO designation program touches the entire Perley Rideau team. In attaining the BPSO designation, the Perley Rideau recognizes the commitment of all staff including Support Services, Human Resources, Allied Health and members of the Therapeutic Recreation and Creative Arts Programming team.

Daniela Acosta, Registered Nurse and former BPSO liaison, helped establish the Champion network. Acosta directly linked the BPSO work to improved practice to benefit residents, including a reduction in falls. She attributed the decline to the introduction of hourly comfort care rounding on residents to meet their needs and improved screening.

Joined by resident Pierrette Leblanc, a Veteran and retired nurse, a new banner was revealed to commemorate the BPSO achievement. The banner now hangs in the atrium that leads to the Health Centre.

In one of several tweets in the hours after the celebration, Dr. Grinspun commended the Perley Rideau team and encouraged the organization to continue to lead in the health sector.

## Update on SeeMe<sup>™</sup>:

## Understanding frailty together

We have received a lot of positive feedback about the SeeMe<sup>™</sup> care conference Agenda and Goals of Care Tool that are being used during care conferences on all long-term care units. For residents and family members who haven't yet had their care conference since February 2019, these tools will be emailed out prior to the care conference. These tools are also available on the Perley Rideau website, in the family resource document holder on each unit, and in each care conference room. For residents and family members, it is helpful to review the tools prior to the care conference to think about some of the future health and personal care preference decisions.

In terms of the rollout of the full SeeMe<sup>™</sup> process, which includes the Comprehensive Frailty-Informed Assessment completed prior to the care conference, two new units have been rolled out every two months. Units with the full SeeMe<sup>™</sup> process are O2E, R2S, G1N, G1S, O1W, and R2N. This represents 50% of the Perley Rideau's long term care units. We are well on our way to becoming a frailty-informed care health organization that identifies and assess frailty as standard clinical practice. Thank you to staff, physicians, families, and residents for your commitment in adopting the new SeeMe<sup>™</sup> tools and processes!

As part of the program evaluation for SeeMe<sup>TM</sup>: Understanding *frailty* together, surveys have started to be distributed to families, physicians, SeeMe<sup>TM</sup> mentors, and registered staff who have received training. Please complete the surveys to help improve the SeeMe<sup>TM</sup> program to optimize the provision of frailty-informed care for residents at the Perley Rideau.

We will be presenting about SeeMe<sup>™</sup>: Understanding *frailty* together and its program evaluation at the Canadian Frailty Network National Conference on September 26, 2019 in Toronto.







## North American leaders gather at the Perley Rideau to advance safety and quality issues in long-term care

Mary Boutette, Chief Operating Officer, was joined by members of the Perley Rideau community to host healthcare leaders from across Canada and the United States to address – and improve -- quality and performance issues in long-term care.

The Seniors Quality Leap Initiative (SQLI) is 13 member organizations and nine strategic partners from across North America. Its mission is to enhance the quality of life and care for seniors by utilizing a structured approach to quality and performance improvement and sharing those recommendations to the broader post–acute and long-term care sectors.

## Questions

### Q: Were other options pursued instead of development where Lupton Hall now stands?

Akos: Over the last two years, the Board of Directors, Senior Management and a team of expert development advisors have worked hard to explore many different development options across our campus – and beyond. This in-depth research and analysis considered long-term opportunities and constraints, including the complex underground infrastructure that exists across our campus. As I mentioned, there is a large sewer truck that runs across the property in front of the Rideau building and there is absolutely no way to build on top of the sewer.

The Lupton Hall location is one of a limited number of options that can accommodate a new building at this time, without needing to demolish and rebuild existing residential units that are home to long-term care beds. The decision to explore the Lupton Hall location for our next phase of on-campus growth was ultimately made based on the location's ideal proximity to existing Village services and amenities. The Lupton Hall location also allows us to preserve other locations on the campus for future, longer-term development and growth.

### Q: Why so many changes?

**Akos:** We aspire to be a respected leader in seniors' care; to innovate and share our knowledge. We have an obligation to address the growing demand for seniors' care; On-campus growth is one avenue for us to alleviate some of the pressure on the system. The project is also an opportunity to improve our sustainability and financial flexibility, setting us up for continued growth and increasing our ability to bring value to the health care system and local community. As a not-for-profit, we have to be innovative while working within our parameters to grow and succeed on our journey to be indispensable to the region's health system

## Q: If parking is limited in the future, will there be accommodation for staff who do not have access to public transit?

Akos: To be honest, that is a question that has not yet been considered. Generally, parking is an understood concern, and is one of several site-wide "capacity" issues being investigated as part of the overall project work. Management commissioned a parking study in early 2019 to better understand traffic flows and the timing of parking shortages and strategies are being pursued by management to address the existing challenges. Long-term parking strategies will depend on the proposed operating model and design of the new building, which will not be known until the end of Phase 1 (spring 2020).

Recognizing that parking pressures are also felt on nearby roads, I remind everyone to continue to be respectful, good neighbours in your interactions with residents on nearby streets.

Q: Will the qualities of hope and warmth symbolized in Lupton Hall, be replicated in the new building?

Akos: There will not be an impact on Lupton Hall until the start of construction, which is estimated for 2021. The proposed building would feature a new multipurpose space that would replace Lupton Hall to support the Spiritual Health needs of our community and host all types of gatherings, both large and small. In late 2019 through 2020, we'll be working with the design team and stakeholders to design interim solutions that would ensure Spiritual Health and operational needs are met during the construction period.

We also want input from the Perley Rideau community. Once we have selected a design team, there will be several opportunities for members of the Perley Rideau Community to have input into the building design, services/amenities, and logistical planning, beginning in the fall of 2019.

## Q: Outside of Surge Learning and in-service training, could we have more certificate education training for staff?

Akos: Certificate programs that have been supported in the past few years include: GPA, LEAP, PIECES, Wound Care, SAFE Training, Frailty Training, Mental Health First Aid, IDEAS Training, BPG Champion Training, ERCC and CPR. Each year the organization conducts a learning needs assessment to understand where to best meet staff learning needs which helps to prioritize education and training. This is a key strategy to ensure that the education and skills required to complete one's role safely and effectively are supported.

Every year registered staff must complete a self-reflection to identify learning needs that will be the basis of a self-directed learning plan. This is a great practice for non-registered staff as well. If there is a learning need identified that the Perley Rideau can support with, please reach out to your manager or Jen Plant and we are more than happy to look at options.

You can stay up-to-date with new education opportunities on the company drive under "education" or via the education board located on the main floor with the HR board.

Thanks to the generous support of the foundation donors, you can also apply to the professional development fund to support courses, conferences, or other professional development opportunities (application on the company drive in the education folder). For more information please speak with Jen Plant, Director, Clinical Practice.

### Q: Will you consider volunteers for training opportunities?

Akos: Yes! Like staff, education and training for volunteers is supported to ensure that the volunteers receives training related to their role in the organization. Volunteers are invited to a number of training and education activities, for example: palliative care training, feeding training, lunch and learns, Gentle Persuasive Approach (GPA) training, learning rounds, ethics education, and abuse and neglect education.

All volunteers are invited to complete an orientation refresher at any time, as the orientation program is updated frequently. Volunteers also have access to Surge Learning, Perley Rideau's online training portal, which includes more than 100 course, on resident care and other relevant information.

### Q: As the number of beds dedicated to Veteran decline, will Veterans get to live in close proximity in the future?

**Akos:** The original strategic plan called for dedicating the Rideau residence for Veterans and repurposing vacant Veteran units in the Ottawa and Gatineau residences. We do know the value that comes with Veterans living together in close proximity. The exact configuration of the residences will depend on the number of Veterans living at the Perley Rideau and the future physical configuration of the campus, which may change with Village Expansion. We continue to advocate with our government partners to expand the 25 beds dedicated to Other Qualified Veterans.

Also, the Independent Living apartments offer priority access to former members of the Canadian Armed Forces, leveraging our responsibility for providing for the unique clinical and social needs of Veterans.

The Foundation's support is also essential to the planned expansion of our Seniors Village."

## **Financial Highlights**

The Perley Rideau made significant strides on the journey to become a Centre of Excellence in Frailty-Informed Care by financing new programs and planning activities. In 2018, we opened the first Sub-Acute Care for Frail Elderly (SAFE) unit and the Specialized Behavioural Support Unit (SBSU). These units bolster our commitment to fulfill unmet healthcare needs in our community. On an ongoing basis the operating costs of these units are funded by the MOHTLC and represent an approximate \$2.8m (9.3%) revenue increase, which is substantially invested in nursing and the personal care of residents. Other investments enhance future sustainability by continuing to diversify our revenue, primarily in our non-long term care operations by expanding the continuum of care services we offer to residents, tenants and seniors throughout the Champlain region.

Our commitment to investing in existing and new infrastructure is strong, as approximately \$2.8m went to capital projects, including the new SAFE and SBSU units. Similarly, more than \$500k was spent constructing the new Interprofessional Clinic to expand the availability of on-site services. Improvements within our long-term care home include new specialty beds and mattresses, appliances and information technology, such as the completion of the installation of the nurse call system.

## Village Expansion Update

The Seniors' Village Expansion project is moving forward with "full steam ahead".

This week we launched a design competition to select an architect. This unique process was intentionally chosen to invite innovation and signature design from the proponents. There will be numerous opportunities for you to provide input and feedback to the design once the successful design team has been selected. We will consult extensively with staff and partners, along with residents, tenants, families and neighbors. These consultations will inform the building's design, as well as logistics, such as an effective parking and traffic strategy so that we can operate as normally as possible during and after construction and in the years ahead.

As many of you heard, our new building will be constructed where Lupton Hall stands today. This decision was not taken lightly, as Lupton Hall is the "heart "of the Perley Rideau. Over the last two years, the Board, Senior Management and a team of expert development advisors have explored several development options across our campus. The analysis considered long-term opportunities and constraints that exist on the campus, including the complex underground infrastructure, easements, parking, existing buildings and open spaces. The Lupton Hall location is one of a limited number of options that can accommodate a new building at this time, without needing to demolish and rebuild existing residential units. The decision to explore the Lupton Hall location for our next phase of on-campus growth was ultimately made based on the location's ideal proximity to existing Village services and amenities. The site provides great access to our clinics and services and leaves options for future development elsewhere on our campus.

Part of the design competition is for proponents to present innovative ideas on replacing Lupton Hall and creating a new multipurpose space in the new built to support the Spiritual Health needs of our community and host all types of gatherings, both large and small.

There are many unknowns at this time, but there are a number of phases and decision points between now and when construction could eventually start. Increased clarity will come at each project phase. We are committed to sharing as much information as we can throughout the journey of the Seniors' Village Expansion. ## Joy in Work Quality Improvement Project Update

### **Project Summary**

The Joy in Work project aims to understand burnout in Personal Support Workers and explore ways to prevent it. The project started with an initial focus on the pilot units G2N and G2S. By engaging with PSWs through a focus group, the team was able to better understand some of the contributing barriers to "joy in work". Teamwork dynamics was the most prevalent theme, and to address this root cause, the team developed a change idea that would utilize the present time in which all staff meet prior to their shifts (shift report). By optimizing this time, we hoped to enhance team dynamics, team problem solving, and opportunities to provide support. A structured shift report agenda was developed that identified key items to be discussed at every report and also identified key soft skills that promote teamwork. We continuously sought staff feedback to make ongoing improvements to the tool.

In December 2018, we trained staff on G2N and G2S on how to use the structured shift report. In terms of weekly data collection, we alternated between G2N and G2S with the single item burnout measure, which consisted of the question: "Overall, based on your definition of burnout, how would you rate your level of burnout?"

Given the complex dynamic of burnout with multiple contributing factors, we have not



seen substantial improvements in the Single Item Burnout Measure. Given that the structured shift report agenda is only one tool out of several in terms of addressing a complex, adaptive system change, it is anticipated that changes in burnout levels may take time to see improvement. However, we have received staff feedback about how the shift report agenda has helped structure and streamline shift report, and has helped improve teamwork.





### **Next Steps**

### 1 Data Collection Moving to Surge

We had been previously collecting paper slips of the Single Item Burnout Measure in our Joy Box, placed at the nursing unit of G2N and G2S on alternating weeks.

Joy has recently graduated from the Joy in Work project and had a beautiful graduation ceremony. As of June 10th, the Single Item Burnout Measure has become available as a survey on Surge for all RPNs and PSWs on all units, and will be recurring on a monthly basis.

### 2 Training Video

We have finished filming a training video on leading shift report with the structured shift report agenda. This training video will be coming soon to Surge!

### 3 Spread to Other Units

The structured shift report agenda will be spread to O1E, O1W and G1N over the next few months with a train-the-trainer model. We held a training session for RPN Champions who will be leading this work, and we will be looking to recruit more Champions as we continue to spread to other units.

## The Family and Friends Council

## Jesika Walker: A Very Nice Dementia Care Coach



## "Oh good, that's where the nice girl is."

So says one of the participants in Let's Get Moving to her caregiver every time they prepare to head out to the Churchill Seniors Recreation Centre. She's referring to Jesika Walker, a volunteer with the Let's Get Moving program who is, as this woman so aptly describes, a very nice girl.

Five years ago Jesika moved to Ottawa from Timmins for an undergrad in psychology at the University of Ottawa. She has just finished her Master's in psychology at Carleton, and is preparing to begin her PhD work in the fall.

Her Master's thesis was about peoples' perception of time, and whether the length or difficulty of a task affects that perception. She's something of a smarty, which is what led her to The Dementia Society of Ottawa and Renfrew County and volunteering in the first place – she had what she described as "an easy semester".

To fill the gaps she looked for somewhere to volunteer, and discovered the Let's Get Moving program where she has been ever since, sitting next to one woman in particular.

Jesika's presence creates a feeling of familiarity for this person with dementia, and she gravitates toward Jes every time she attends Let's Get Moving. It's a large class, and there are several volunteers to help other participants, so Jes is happy to give this woman a lot of attention.

Attending a Let's Get Moving class is about exercise, but also about socializing with other people. It's about being out in the community and including people with dementia. It's also about assisting their caregivers and providing a safe and comfortable environment.

As Jesika now prepares for her PhD in neuropsychology, with a focus on the assessment of people with dementia, she also has a new job. She has been hired by The Dementia Society as a Dementia Care Coach, a job she will be doing part-time while completing her studies. Now, everyone who comes through the doors of The Dementia Society can have a similar experience to the one that woman with dementia and her caregiver had at Let's Get Moving Churchill. They get to see the nice girl.

# News about the Perley Rideau Entrances and Numbering System

We have changed the unique numbers linked to each of the Health Centre entrances.

This has been done to help visitors and raise the profile of the Main Entrance and to make it easier first responders to navigate our campus.

As a result, the Main Entrance is now #1 and the Rideau building entrance is #2. The numbers for the Ottawa and Gatineau buildings and the Guest House remain the same. The address numbers for the 2 apartment buildings also remain the same.

The doors are now marked this way:

- Perley Rideau Main Entrance: 1
- Rideau Building: 2
- Ottawa Building: 3
- Gatineau Building: 4
- Guest House: 5

New illuminated number signs will soon be installed at each of the entrances to improve the visibility of each entrance during the day and at night.

We have also updated the Perley Rideau maps and they can be accessed on the Perley Rideau website (<u>http://www.perleyrideau.ca/upload/documents/maps\_perley\_rideau\_may\_29\_2019.pdf</u>)

Maps will soon be available on the Commissionaire's desk at the Main Entrance.
