Perley Rideau has a proud history of service. This past year we have advanced our strategic plan to expand these services and reach a larger number of those in need within our community.

Several key objectives stood out in 2011, including implementing our Assisted Living Services program, commencing construction of two apartment buildings on the Perley Rideau property, and increasing short-stay care programs. Above all was our objective to maintain the high level of care for those we serve.

Implementing our strategy to create a Seniors' Village requires many changes in operations, resources, organizational structure, skills and capabilities. Through this process, we maintained the excellent quality of care on which our reputation is based, which is reflected by the very positive feedback we received from the survey of residents conducted this past year. We are pleased to report that 83% of our residents expressed a high level of satisfaction with Perley Rideau.

We have a long tradition of serving veterans. We will continue to do so, and are working diligently to be there for the future needs of former Canadian Forces members. We will also provide support to a much larger number of seniors from the community at large.

Next year, we will continue to move forward on our Strategic Plan objectives, including the completion and rental of the seniors' apartment buildings, setting up the Seniors' Primary Care and Wellness Centre in collaboration with the South-East Ottawa Community Health Centre, enhancing behavioural support and clinical placement programs, and expanding non-medical services on site, to name a few.

We are very grateful for the dedication of our Board members, staff and volunteers. We would also like to acknowledge the role of the Foundation in the continuing success of Perley Rideau and thank the community for its ongoing support. The challenges ahead, to fully realize our strategy and continue to be sustainable for the future, are achievable through the efforts of government and the community we serve.

About Perley Rideau

Perley Rideau is a not-for-profit centre for healthy living, primarily focused on providing quality care for seniors, with a unique responsibility to provide for veterans and community residents.

Building on its many years of experience and excellent reputation in long-term care, Perley Rideau has recently expanded programs and services, along the continuum of care. By continuum of care, we mean facilities and structured programs and services such that seniors have the choice to access different levels of support to fit their current level of need.

A key component of this continuum of care is Assisted Living Services provided to seniors in their own homes. It is complemented by various programs such as convalescent care, daily or short-term duration respite care at the Long-Term Care Health Centre, or respite at the Guest House to allow caregivers of people affected by dementia time off. We are also developing the Wellness Centre to provide access to preventative and primary care. All of the above programs and services are overseen by a team of health care professionals.

Starting in January 2013, seniors may choose to stay in an apartment in one of two residences (139 apartments now under

construction) on the Perley Rideau property on Russell Road where Assisted Living Services will also be provided as needed.

At the same location is the Long-Term Care Health Centre, home to 419 permanent residents, including 250 veterans and 169 community members, as well as 31 spaces for short-term convalescent and respite care. A variety of creative arts, recreational, and volunteer programs contribute to residents' daily life. We welcome family and friends who add richness to the life of residents.

Perley Rideau is respected for its experience and innovative approaches to dementia care. Building on this solid foundation, and in collaboration with other like-minded organizations, it continues to develop in-house expertise in support of a nurturing, safe and dignified environment for people affected by dementia.

The Perley and Rideau Veterans' Health Centre Foundation is an integral part of Perley Rideau. It has launched a \$5 million *Building Choices, Enriching Lives Capital Campaign* to complete the funding of the seniors' housing expansion program. The Foundation also provides annual supplemental financial support to help sustain the quality of life enjoyed by Perley Rideau residents and clients.

Performance

Perley Rideau has developed a long-term strategy with annual objectives to track progress towards creating a Seniors' Village. Objectives have been substantially met. The following report gives details of our performance in 2011 for key initiatives, some of which extend into 2012-13.

Long-Term Care Health Centre

n 2011, we had 499 admissions, of which 349 were for short-term care. These shortterm care admissions were divided almost evenly between convalescent and respite care. The Convalescent Care Program admits people from acute care hospitals. Respite care beds are dedicated to give caregivers time off. Compared to 2010, we experienced an increase of 30% in the number of admissions to long-term care, from 115 to 150. We have noted that the acuity of health issues, and the age of those being admitted, are increasing. As a reflection of ever-increasing resident health requirements on admission, we noted that 148 of the long-term care residents were transferred to local acute care institutions, an increase of 33 this year over last year.

STATISTICS:

Long-term care – 419 beds with 99% occupancy Convalescent care – 22 beds with 92.3% occupancy Respite care – 9 beds with 63.6% occupancy

Assisted Living Services, Day Program, and Guest House

These programs all support those who choose to live in their own homes.

STATISTICS:

Assisted Living Services – opened in March 2011 – 88 referrals
Day program – 2,635 visits
Guest House – 12 bedrooms with 60% occupancy

For 2012, the focus will be on the continuing improvement of the quality of life for our community and extending the Assisted Living Services to the apartments. On-site diagnostic services are being explored. Discussions are ongoing with local institutions, both in the long-term and acute care domains.




2011 Financial Overview


standard revenues increased from \$43.3 million in 2010 to \$45.2 million in 2011 or 4.3% with the largest percentage increase realized from the Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care, up 7.8%. This increase is primarily caused by the start-up of the Assisted Living Services program for care at home. Overall, there was a small excess of revenues over expenses similar to last year's results. Capital expenditures increased to \$4.3 million, primarily related to the start of construction of the seniors' housing apartments late in the year.



In 2011, your donations were used to fill a variety of needs that includes purchasing of specialized equipment, refurbishing of several building areas, supporting our creative arts programs, and breaking ground on the two independent and assisted living seniors' apartment buildings scheduled for completion in 2012–13.

The Foundation continues to support the Seniors' Village initiative through its special \$5 million Capital Campaign, *Building Choices, Enriching Lives* to complete the funding of the two seniors' apartments and other initiatives to expand services and programs. In



keeping with our tradition, Canadian Forces members will have priority access to 20% to 30% of the apartments. A Campaign Cabinet has been formed to lead this special effort, co-chaired by Kenneth Dye and Merv Beckstead. Three distinguished Honorary Co-chairs will also lead the way: Mrs. Marguerite (Grete) Hale, C.M., G.J., LL.D., G.C.L.J., F.C.G.S., F.R.H.S.C.; General (Ret'd) Rick Hillier, OC, CMM, MSC, CD; and Mrs. Barbara Ann Scott, OC. Creating a Seniors' Village: next steps



e have set objectives for the next two years to make progress on all major strategy areas and complete the key elements of the expanded programs and services.

This includes the building of the two seniors' apartments shown above, their equipping, staffing, including preparation for providing Assisted Living Services, and finally the rental of the apartments. These apartments will give seniors a choice of accommodation that will allow autonomy with graduated support and services.

The Primary Care and Wellness Centre, to be set up in collaboration with the South-East Ottawa Community Health Centre, Day Program and Guest House respite care services, and Assisted Living Services delivered to seniors' homes, will truly provide a comprehensive system of care to allow seniors the choice of staying in their homes longer.

Alongside these projects are a variety of initiatives to increase and enhance services including short-term care, behavioural and clinical placement programs, as well as introducing additional non-medical services on site as a convenience to residents and to increase revenues.


