One of the highlights of the day was the making of giant bubbles.



Many of you were intrigued with the size of the bubbles and have asked us for the bubble making instructions. So, here they are:

1 part Joy or Dawn Ultra dish soap 11 parts water (distilled works best) 34 tablespoon of glycerin (available at any drug store) Let the solution sit overnight for best results.

The wand consists of two dowels with braided cotton string tied in a circle between them. The braided cotton string improves the absorbency of the dish soap.

To make a bubble:

Put the wand into the bubble solution, keeping the string loop closed (dowels close together). Lift the string from the solution and allow it to drain for about ten seconds. Gently open the string by separating the dowel sticks and step backwards to form bubble (you can also let the wind do the work for you). Slowly bring dowel sticks back together to close off the bubble.

Say "Wow!" or "Oooooo!"

These kinds of events are great and necessitate planning and the cooperation of a lot of people. A big thank you goes to all of you who contributed to our 2014 Village Fair on Saturday, September 6. Your efforts are valued, recognized and gratefully acknowledged.

Saying goodbye to two Perley Rideau Friends

Dr. Cosman

We are sad to report the passing of Doctor Herbert H. Cosman, known to countless residents and their families, staff, volunteers and Board members.

Dr. Cosman was born in 1926 and grew up in Winnipeg. He obtained his Doctor of Medicine from the University of Manitoba in 1949. He received his Fellowship in Internal Medicine from the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons in 1955 and was admitted to the American College of Physicians and American Society of Internal Medicine in 2002. Between 1948 and 1955, he filled several internships.

Dr. Cosman was a pioneer in Geriatric Medicine. He was a founder and acting chief of the new Geriatric Assessment Program, Ottawa Civic Hospital, 1983-1984. He also served at the Perley Hospital and the Perley Veteran's Health Centre as the Chief of Medical Staff, 1959-1997.

He created and headed a Geriatric Rehabilitation In-patient Program at the Perley in 1960 and it stood as the only rehabilitation unit for elderly persons in Ottawa until 1986. He was also active in many aspects of community health care in Ottawa.

An annual Dr. Herbert H. Cosman Lecture in Geriatrics commenced in 1991. Teaching appointments included Associate Professor of Medicine, University of Ottawa, 1965 -1991, and also a member of the Clinical Teaching Unit, 1965-1983, as well as full time teaching and supervision of residents training in Geriatric Medicine, 1983-1991, Ottawa Civic Hospital, 1965-1983.

Brant Scott



We are also very sad to report the sudden passing of Brant Scott, long-time editor of the Foundation's *Between Us* newsletter. He died at the age of 62 on September 16, 2014. He leaves behind his loving wife Susan (Presley) and two children in their early twenties.

Brant came from the community. Over the vears, he wrote or edited countless articles showcasing the Foundation and its efforts to fundraise in the Between Us (BU) newsletter, in Fifty-Five Plus magazine and many other community newspapers. He personally took all of the photographs for the BU. Some of you may have spotted him around the buildings, interviewing residents and tenants, consulting and sharing a laugh with his good friend and colleague Daniel Clapin, Foundation Executive Director, taking photographs, attending Foundation meetings or simply chatting with the many volunteers and employees.

Brant was always bright and cheerful. His expertise in writing and communications will be dearly missed by the Foundation staff.

His last BU will be released this fall.

The parking lot signage is in place, and, therefore, the arrangements that were signaled in the May BUB are now in effect.

Two small changes have been made as reflected in the revised parking map attached: i) some parking spaces have been added for visitors near the entrance to the Gatineau residence and ii) tenant parking in front of 1720 has been extended a few spaces at the expense of visitor parking in the same area. Note that new stop signs have been erected at the main entrance when entering and exiting.

Increased parking for staff - The lot across from the Guest House is designated solely for staff parking and the old staff entrance has been opened to allow better access to the main building. The parking areas designated for staff are to be used by the day shift only when parking is at a premium. For other shifts, staff may also use the various visitor parking areas and are encouraged, for safety reasons, to park near the 1750 main entrance. Please do not park in the first row closest to the building on each side of the 1720 entrance.

Note that volunteers, students, and employees of other service providers should follow the same directions as indicated for staff. Parking areas for tenants should be respected at all times. In addition, kindly keep the fire lanes and parking next to the Hydro line clear at all times. Parking will be monitored for adherence between 7 am and 3 pm Mon. – Fri.

I am hoping that the signage is clear, and that the new arrangements, made with your input, will be an improvement.
