Pandemic Planning and Actions

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Perley Rideau

March

March 12 – We intensified our hygiene and housekeeping measures.

- Enhanced auditing of Infection Prevention and Control (IPAC) practices including hand hygiene and environmental cleaning.
- Ongoing IPAC training through Surge Learning.
- Focused 1:1 training.

March 13 - All onsite programs closed (Day Program, Dementia Society).

March 13 – Command Centre formed to oversee Perley Rideau response to COVID-19.

March 13 – Town Hall meetings for all three shifts to inform and educate about the novel coronavirus.

March 14 – Protocols introduced to protect the Perley Rideau community:

- Limiting access to only one door and only essential visitors those who have a resident who is very ill and dying. At least one member of the management team at the screening desk at every shift change.
- Implementation of screening of all staff: 1) Respiratory symptoms? 2) Travel outside Canada? 3) Close contact with probable or confirmed COVID-19 case? 4) Close contact with someone with respiratory symptoms who has been outside Canada? -Fail screen means staff are recommended to seek testing and self-isolate for 14 days.

March 15 – Guest House closed.

March 20 – Access restrictions expanded to include:

• Privately hired sitters, many of whom visit residents in other facilities.

March 20 – Only essential volunteers permitted (admissions, feeding, palliative, Boutique).

March 22 – Enhanced screening at the Main Entrance including temperature checks.

April

April 1 – All volunteers restricted.

New screening measures: All staff who fail screening are required to be tested (prior it had just been recommended). If positive, staff must self-isolate for 14 days and receive 2 negative test results at least 24 hours apart before returning to work.

April 5 – Staff requested to choose one place of employment.

April 8 – Staff members working in a home on outbreak are not permitted to return to work until they are tested for COVID-19 or self-isolate for 14 days.

Together, we improve the well-being of the people we serve



April 9 – Universal mask policy introduced, staff provided procedural or cloth mask based on work requirements and social distancing.

April 12 – New screening measures: Screening includes atypical symptoms (fatigue, malaise, headache, etc.) with follow up questions to explain symptoms.

- April 14 Ministry of Health directs universal masking for long-term care homes.
- April 14 Ministry of Health limits staff to one employer.
- April 15 First staff member tests positive for COVID-19. Facility-wide outbreak declared.
- April 18 22 COVID-19 testing on all residents. Testing ongoing for all staff.
- April 20 Six residents text positive for COVID-19. All are asymptomatic.
- April 21 Cloth masks for non-clinicians changed to procedural masks for all staff.

April 21 – To prevent virus transmission, staff are required to wear Personal Protective Equipment when caring for residents, regardless of symptoms.

April 25 - Targeted COVID-19 testing continues on residents and staff.
